




## **ABOUT THE STEERING GROUP**



Mis serves on the Board for the UN Voluntary Fund for Indigenous Peoples and is the Executive Director of the Julian Cho Society, a nonprofit Indigenous organization, which-together with its community partners, the Maya Leaders Alliance and Toledo Alcaldes Association-comprises traditional leaders from southern Belize's 40 Maya villages and led strategic litigation to affirm the Maya's customary rights to their ancestral lands. Mís holds an Associate's degree in Natural Resources Management from the University of Belize and a Bachelor's degree in Geography from the University of Hawaii. He completed graduate work in Human and Social Development with specialization in Indigenous Governance at the University of Victoria, Canada.



Cunningham is the Vice President of the Indigenous Women's organization Wangki Tangni, and acts as a Latin American and the Caribbean liaison for the Sustainable Development Goals as part of the Indigenous Peoples Major Group. She is also part of the Indigenous Peoples' Global Partnership on Climate Change, Forests and Sustainable Development (Elatia), and is an active observer in the Green Climate Fund (GCF). She has worked in participatory research and local development with Indigenous peoples and women, focusing on issues of Indigenous territorial governance and participatory natural resource management in Latin America. Cunningham earned a Bachelor's degree from the University of the Valley of Guatemala.



Magata is the Communications Officer of the Indigenous Peoples' International Centre for Policy Research and Education (TEBTEBBA), Philippines. She has dedicated the past 15 years to working in the fields of research, education, and communication, specifically on Indigenous Peoples' rights, climate change, community development, and climate finance. Helen served as an alternate active observer in the Green Climate Fund from 2017 to 2018. She is also part of the newly constituted Indigenous Peoples Advisory Group (IPAG) to the GCF. Magata holds a Master's degree in Development Communication from the Philippines Open University.

She is also the national coordinator of the Indigenous Peoples National Steering Committee on Climate Change, a national network hosted by MPIDO that coordinates and mobilizes Kenya's Indigenous Peoples in their efforts to address the challenges of climate change. Samante holds a Master's degree in Business Administration in Strategic Management and a Bachelor's degree in Commerce from the Catholic University of Eastern Africa, Kenya. She currently is a candidate for the PhD degree in Leadership and Governance at Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology, Kenya.

Ole Riamit is an Indigenous Peoples' leader from the Pastoralists Maasai Community of southern Kenya. He is the Founder/Director of Indigenous Livelihoods Enhancement Partners (ILEPA) a nonprofit community-based organization advocating self-determination for Indigenous Peoples. Kimaren holds of a Master's degree in Development Anthropology from McGill University, Canada; a Postgraduate Diploma in Project Planning and Management from the Catholic University of Eastern Africa, Kenya; and a Bachelor's degree in Food, Nutrition, and Dietetics from Egerton University, Kenya.
