Session 5: Synergies on land-use/REDD+ in countries' INDCs submitted to the UNFCCC and national strategy documents and REDD+ programmes

The aim of this session is to discuss how land use has been covered in INDCs submitted by REDD+ countries. More specifically, the session will start with an introduction to Lima guidance on INDCs, followed by findings of a comparison of forest targets and accounting approaches in INDCs compared with REDD+ strategy documents and programs. REDD+ country representatives will then provide commentaries on their INDCs with view to land use. Finally, panellists and the plenary will discuss experiences from the INDC processes, discuss potential gaps/mismatches in INDCs and REDD+ strategies and programs, lessons learned for the way forward, etc.
