General Information



Main data:

- Target countries: 15 FCPF CF countries
- Financing: Euro 20M contribution of Germany BMZ
- Time period: 2021-2025
- **Objectives:** to enhance the inclusion of beneficiary marginalized communities and disadvantaged groups in emission reductions programs to maximize their carbon and non-carbon benefits
- Beneficiaries: Indigenous Peoples, Local Communities, disadvantaged groups (women, youth, persons with disabilities)
- Governance Body: Steering Committee → CERF's Partnership Council
- Program's Trustee: EnABLE Secretariat in the Bank's Climate Change Group

Types of Programming:

- Country Programming: Managed by Social Sustainability and Inclusion Global Practice (SSI)
- Knowledge and Capacity Building Programming: Managed by SSI, other GPs and Units of the Bank
 - Programming can be flexible to reflect the country and IPLCs context, design of the BSP and availability of EnABLE and other resources;
 - Programming can be modular depending on the country context, needs and interests, and available resources;
 - Programming can be stand alone or co financing other Bank's financed operations;
 - Programming will be aligned with other Government, World Bank's, Development Partners' operations.





Enable Key Priorities



Three main priorities:

- Strengthen capabilities of the target beneficiaries to engage in RBCF programs and benefit from them through capacity and skills building, voice and empowerment,
- Enhance the enabling environment by supporting target beneficiaries' collaboration and partnerships with key stakeholders, and ensuring that target beneficiaries lead and benefit from ERPs through appropriately designed pilot activities; and
- Integrate social inclusion and gender equity in the design and implementation of ERPs through knowledge transfer and the sharing of best practices.

- Promoting direct access to finance.

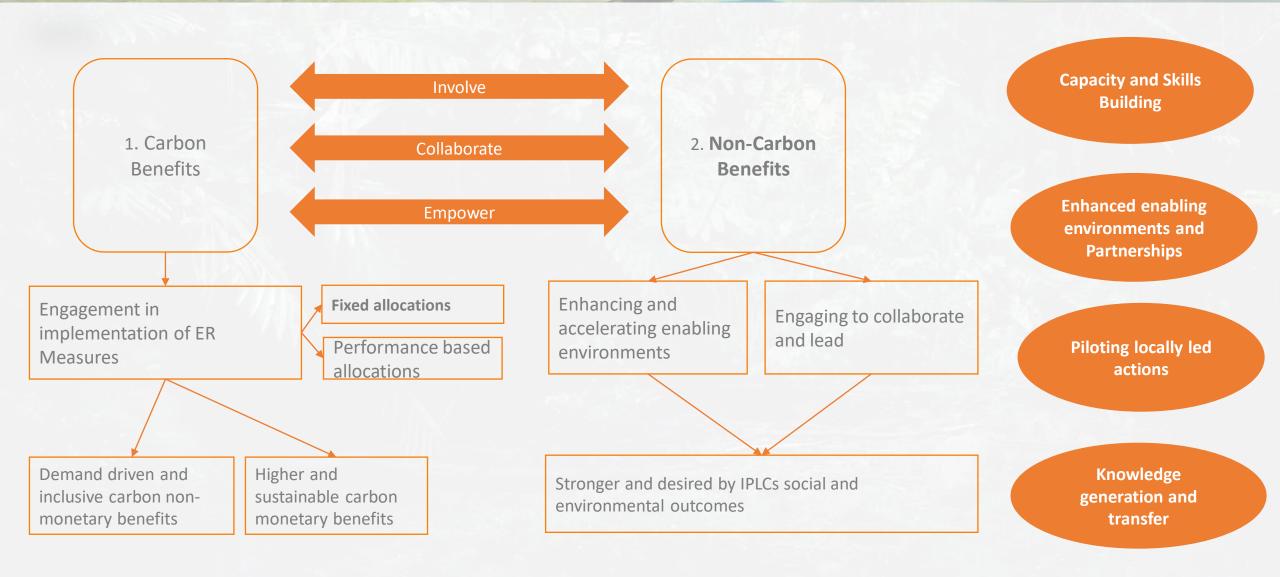






Programming: Access to Benefits

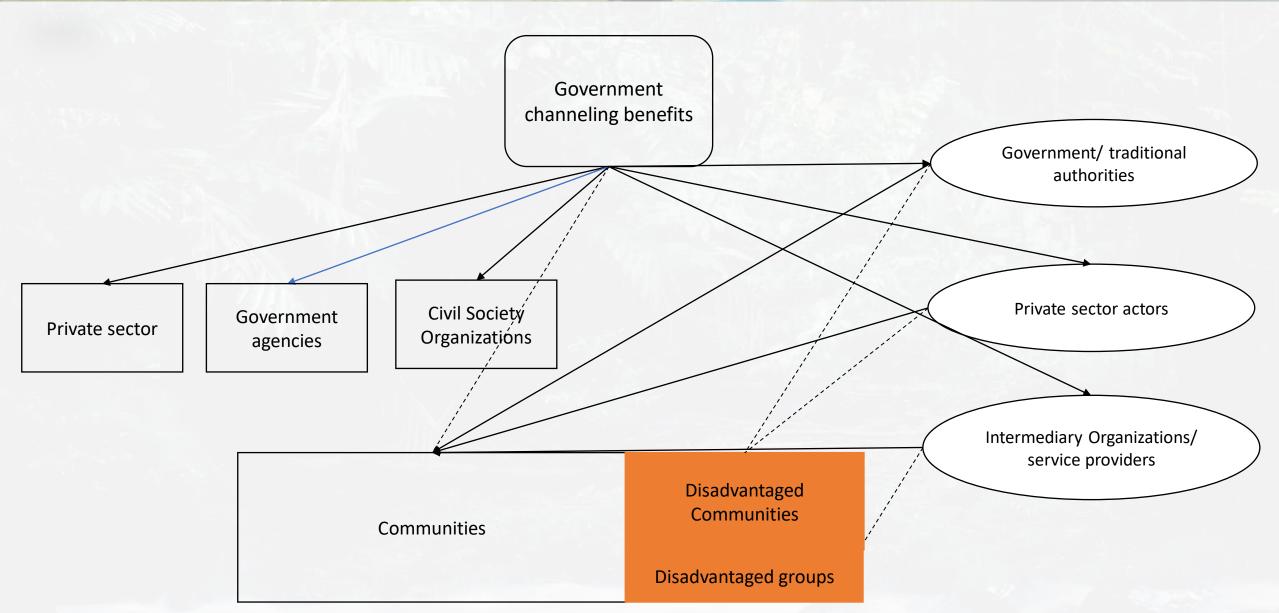






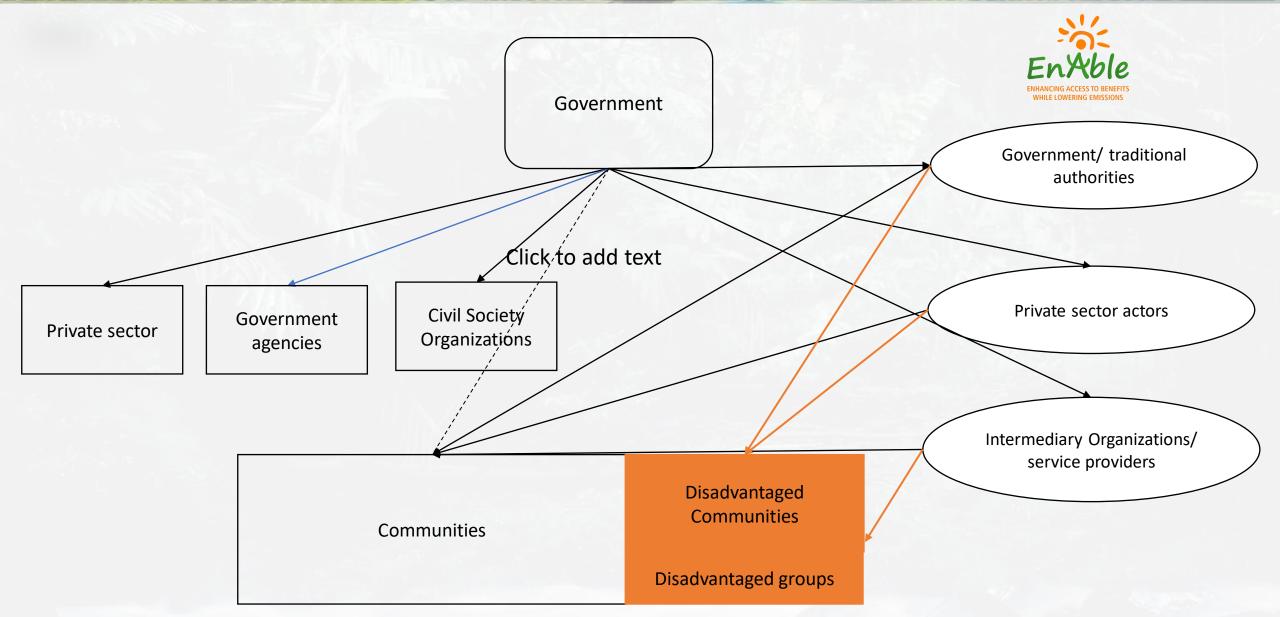
Programming: Different modalities of Benefits Allocation

Programming: Lao PDR Benefit Sharing Plan



- Direct beneficiaries: an estimated 42,000 rural households, totaling approximately 254,000 people. These figures represent approximately 20% of the total rural population across the six provinces.
- The focus of the ER Program in securing rural land tenure will primarily be through village level land use plans and Village Forest Management Plans (VFMPs).
- Benefits for communities will be in a long-term investment such as seeds for farm, improving agroforestry system, livestock, and similar investments.
- Seventy seven percent (77%) will be allocated as performance-based allocations to communities, sub-national government agencies and pilot initiatives.

Community Level	Monetary	Non-monetary ⁷	
Communities (including village institutions, farmer groups, cooperatives, women enterprise groups)	Benefits are channeled through Village Development Committees (VDCs) - operational costs for the Village Development Committee	Non-monetary benefits are as follows: Training in managing funding for community, facilitating communities (e.g., awareness, conflict resolution, etc.). Capacity building/training and equipment for FLR, SFM, CSA, and livelihoods opportunities for communities. Forest law enforcement, including patrolling, equipment, and capacity building/training. Development projects (e.g., health, education, public facilities) that do not contribute to deforestation and forest degradation. Additional livelihood support for community businesses, including capacity building/training, equipment, market access, or agricultural inputs. Secure land tenure Improved productivity from access to agricultural extension services such as farmer field schools	The monetary benefit is given to compensate the operational cost for VDC under the ER Program implementation. The monetary benefit (not in cash) is given to provide incentives for community achievements in reducing emissions, and to implement long-term strategies in protecting forest and improving community livelihood, as community is the key actor in environmental protection. The non-monetary benefit is given as a support for activities to improve the capabilities in managing and implementing the ER Program on the ground at the village level.

- All eligible communities in the provinces will each prepare community workplans and budgets.
- The PMUs would assist VDCs and provide capacity building to develop work plans and budgets, and would also support communities to establish village committees, if necessary or upon request. In addition, training for VDCs in accounts, micro-credit, bookkeeping, and monitoring would be provided.
